

"Where does our money go?"

Each October, we celebrate the ministries made possible through our stewardship of God's gifts and consider what our gifts of financial support for the coming year will be. Here's how our gifts are allocated in support of God's work this year:



Outreach & Mission: 23% (\$157,614.00)

Twenty-three cents of every dollar received by Trinity goes to support our ministry to the local community and beyond. This includes programs that we initiate and run on our own as well as those for which we partner with others. Some examples:

Mission Support to the New England Synod, TV Ministry, Annual Meal Packing Event, In the Hour of Need (homeless support and sheltering), Trinityworc.org website, Little Free Pantry, Necessities for Neighbors, Carty Cupboard food pantry, Neighborhood Support Team (Afghan refugee resettlement), Ministry to Trinity Preschool students and families

Worship & Music: 22% (\$149,237.00)

Worship is the primary function of any church, and musical support of worship is a hallmark of the Lutheran tradition. Twenty-two cents of every dollar received supports the necessary resources, planning, writing and composition, and coordination of forces to create liturgical and other events that are uplifting, inspiring, and that build and support community. These include:

Sunday chapel and nave liturgies, Wednesday night worship, Festival liturgies with special music, Presentations of large works of sacred music, Weddings and funerals, Choir rehearsals, Music for Trinity Preschool

Faith & Education: 18% (\$125,722.00)

Eighteen cents of every dollar received supports ministries that encourage and strengthen growth and education in the Christian faith among our members, such as:

Bible studies, Trinity News, weekly E-News, Adult Forum, Family Sunday School, Wednesday Night Alive, Stewardship

Pastoral Care: 16% (\$108,418.00)

Pastoral care, provided primarily by the pastor and members of the professional staff, is supported by sixteen cents of every income dollar. Some of this ministry is public, but much is private; its importance to those whom it touches is therefore not always evident. Pastoral Care includes:

Pastoral home and hospital visits, Care Team ministry to the homebound, bereavement ministry, Pre-marital counseling, Staff counseling and review, Counsel and guidance for church governance committees and ministry teams

Fellowship: 11% (\$77,474.00)

Fellowship is about community-building and improving communication and understanding among members of the congregation. Eleven cents of every dollar received supports events such as:

Coffee hour on Sunday, The annual Church Picnic, Luncheons on the Green and Senior Luncheons, Nave walking sessions, Book discussion clubs

Welcoming: 10% (\$69,554.00)

Ministries that welcome visitors and encourage them to return are supported by ten cents of every income dollar. While welcoming the stranger is part of what we practice, organized efforts include

Greeters and ushers, Support of Worcester Pride, Follow-up with worship guests, Coordination of music groups and others using the building

The income that supports these ministries doesn't all come from members' gifts. Church members' pledged gifts account for over 54% of Trinity's total income. Another 11% of income comes from our Mission Endowment Fund, drawn from the growth and earnings of its investments. Recent turmoil in the financial markets has reduced the value of those investments, making withdrawals of this magnitude unsustainable. At the same time, the cost of many staples of everyday life has increased, by an estimated 8-9%. Those factors make these ministries harder to fund, even as they have become more necessary and relevant.

This challenge to the continuation of our ministries could be met by scaling them back. However, as should be evident from the foregoing descriptions, much of Trinity's ministry is done, supported or otherwise made possible by the Pastor, Cantor, and Minister of Youth, Education and Outreach, our professional staff. Thus, much of the expense of those ministries is related to staff compensation. Any economy expected to be realized would involve a reduction in staff, which would drastically reduce or eliminate the associated ministries. This is a hard thing to do, and an even harder thing to come back from, as a reduction in ministry is usually followed by a reduction in giving.

Alternatively, our ministries and staff could be preserved if each of us increased our financial pledge, by about 1% of our annual income. Thirteen members of the Council and Finance Committee have already signed on to this idea by submitting their increased pledges for 2023 early, at the beginning of September. During October, worshipers at the Sunday liturgies will hear from some of them about how they were inspired to make that leap of faith, and on Commitment Sunday, October 23, they will be invited to follow suit. A third way—no, there is no third way to address this problem. Either we make a prayerful, sober commitment to increase our pledged gifts, or we commit to reducing the scope of God's work at Trinity by eliminating one or more positions. Either decision could be described as transformative, but only one could be called inspired.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S REPORT-KAREN COUTURIER

The Congregation Council focused on two large agenda items at our September meeting: updates and progress from August to September on the TLC Preschool and the 2023 Budget.

TLC Preschool

We're pleased to report increased enrollment with 5 new students registered since our August meeting and a number of inquiries and tours. The preschool has expanded hours to 7:30-5pm. The Board will continue to monitor enrollment and marketing efforts to promote the TLC preschool. A subcommittee is reviewing the Preschool Director job description and performance evaluation.

The Council affirmed that TLC Christian Preschool is a ministry of Trinity that Welcomes, Proclaims and Serves in Christ's name. Our Ministry Staff (Pastor Nathan, Mark and Jena) continues to interactive with Preschool children every week with weekly chapel and music lessons. A letter of support, encouragement and expectations will be sent to Patti and the preschool teachers affirming the preschool as a ministry of the congregation.

2023 Budget

The Council focused on the budget challenges we face in 2023. Given our goal towards a balanced budget we considered how to reduce our expenses without compromising our ministry goals and mission while finding ways to maximize our income through pledges and building use fees.

Council has consensus on the following outline:

- No staffing cuts in 2023. Our current staffing pattern supports our ministry goals and mission identified in the CAT
- Balanced budget for 2024 (defined as no more than 5% MEF draw). If required, staff cuts would be implemented for 2024 to balance the budget.
- Focus on growing our income/revenue through pledging, other offerings, and building use fees.
- Careful use of the MEF (Mission Endowment Fund) Treasurer recommends maximum draw of approximately \$66k for 2023
- Continue to work on goals & priorities identified in the CAT.

The CAT survey tells us percentage giving at Trinity is lower compared to other mainline churches. CAT benchmark for giving is 3% of household income. Trinity falls just below 2% of household income on average. Stewardship reported earlier this year that if each person increased their pledge to the next percentage level, we could balance our budget and not need to draw on the Mission Endowment Fund.

Members of the Finance committee along with the Council were invited to pledge early and increase their percentage giving. <u>Finance reported thirteen early pledges were submitted reflecting an increase of 13% over their 2022 pledge</u>.

If each of us increase our percentage giving, we will make an impact on balancing the budget and supporting our congregation's mission.

CHURCH MOUSE

The Personnel Committee has enlisted the help of the Church Mouse to communicate with the congregation the work the staff puts in during weekdays, and behind the scenes, to keep the ministry moving forward in mission.

Hello Congregants! It was another busy month for our hardworking staff. When you see them, make sure to thank them! Here are some highlights of what they have been up to in the summer months:

<u>TLC's Building Manager Frank Ricardo</u> and his able crew have been holding up the walls and ceilings of this voluminous building nicely over the summer and into the fall. Five new windows have been installed in the multipurpose room and the concrete pad outside of the entrance to the Nave and Jeppson Hall has been replaced (ah, church mouse misses all those crumbling cracks and crevices).

Painting and stucco repair of the hallway outside handicap bathrooms, boiler room, maintenance room has been completed and new signs have been added to better identify the rooms. The baseboard in the Fellowship Hall has been replaced (complicated by deteriorating stucco on the wall in front of the kitchen but really needed since existing baseboard was falling off and painted two different colors). There was a leaky water pipe in the boys' bathroom next to the gym that needed replacing. It turns out both hot and cold water pipes were pitted and needed replacement. That required the stucco concrete ceiling be removed (oie!) and replaced with a suspended ceiling that will give the maintenance crew easy access to all pipes with no restrictions (which also SAVES MONEY if future issues arise!)

A total of 32 switches and outlets were replaced with new childproof ones throughout basement level /TEC area. A new vanity light was installed in a TEC bathroom, three classrooms' floors were refinished, more coat hooks were added, and new shelves installed.

In April TLC had another sewer backup, this time in the boiler room, and again caused by something being flushed that shouldn't have been. The boiler room was ankle deep in sewage (a yucky mess, even for a church mouse!) It was cleaned up by a TLC crew and then professionally cleaned and sanitized. Luckily no damage to any boiler room equipment!

Three dying trees in parking lot where dumpster is located will soon be removed and replaced with new trees which will be better adapted to the location. Two split doors are being replaced and because the dishwasher in the Sacristy keeps tripping the breaker (overload on one circuit), it will be given its own circuit soon. So much work to keep those walls and ceilings up!

<u>Cantor Mark Mummert</u> has engaged in many of the usual monthly duties for August/September: full staff/ministry staff meetings, rehearsals as the Trinity Choir gears up for fall music, Bible Studies, and Preschool music classes. He reports that the collaboration with the Worcester Youth Orchestras began September 11, with rehearsals for that community organization scheduled weekly on Sunday and Mondays (church mouse loves the halls filled with music!).

<u>Pastor Nathan</u>, in addition to Eucharists, sermons, meetings with staff and church committees, and visitations with parishioners, conducted Welcome Desk Training and Appreciation on August 31 for the 9 volunteers who will cover the Welcome Desk as Chris Jackal recovers from her knee surgery. He also indicates that he will compile the October Trinity News (while Cantor Mark handles the Sunday bulletin and Jena monitors the Welcome Desk email inbox.) Pastor also participated in Food Insecurity meetings in August, joining local advocates and officials at Belmont AME Zion and Rev. Eugene Cho, Executive Director of "Bread for the World." He continues to reflect on the Congregational Budget and the staffing decisions connected to that, encouraging Council to ground decisions on what the C.A.T. survey told us (oooh, that cat again!), and to remember that we are a faith community and should make decisions from that faith base.

Youth/Outreach/Family Minister Jena Hill continues to participate actively in all the usual mechanizations of TLC and to think forward about levels of engagement the Congregation can handle and what role TLC can play in the future. She cites author Simon Sinek (Start with Why) who discusses the potential relevance of the future church, wondering whether it is like other "old-fashioned industries" that, in their inability to change with the times, encourage their own irrelevance. This author uses a music analogy: "similar to how the music industry behaved as iTunes disrupted it. People didn't stop listening to music, they just changed how they listened. Similarly, it's not that people are losing their spirituality, it's just that they aren't turning to the church for answers."

Jena continues to foster connections with WPI (the church mouse saw for itself a group of Tau Kappa Epsilon students attending the Church Picnic in September). The students were invited to the meal packing event in November. She also attended a Religion and Spiritual Life reception at the college. Meanwhile, she is helping to restructure Necessities for Neighbors, working on LFP (the Little Free Pantry - which needs a willing leader!), and the 2023 budget. She also met with Pr. Elizabeth Nees of Natick to help plan Faith Formation for families.
