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Reflecting on Change in a Liminal Season – Jena Hill

As the long days of summer transition into the more mellow hues of fall, we find ourselves in what is referred to as a "liminal season." Liminality is a new word for me. I was introduced to it through a book recommendation "How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You're Going: Leading in a Liminal Season" by Susan Beaumont. Liminality is a concept that describes a period of transition, a space between what was and what will be. As a member of the ministry staff, it seems to me that we are in a liminal season at Trinity because we are in-between some changes.

This summer began with some profound changes at Trinity. You might be aware of some of them. Others might be surprising. Liminal seasons provide opportunities for growth, renewal and discovery. In no particular order, here are some of the changes and my own reflections on what this means for us.

Change #1: The TLC Christian Preschool officially closed on June 30th. I wasn't prepared for how much the loss of the preschool would affect my day-to-day rhythms at Trinity. I miss interacting with the teachers and students. It's a new way of being at Trinity without the Preschool but I'm excited for what's next.

What's next for Trinity with the spaces that the Preschool used? The Congregation Council has entered into a building use agreement with the Clemente program. For several years, Clemente has been using our space to provide childcare two times a week in the evenings while the parents of the children are in classes taught by local professors at the Worcester Art Museum. Clemente will be occupying the largest room on the 2nd floor to use for their programming for the coming year.

Even though the hallways where the preschool children used to be are quiet right now, there's still a lot of activity going on in the preschool spaces to prepare the rooms for the next users. Supplies, toys and educational materials are being sorted and organized. Rooms are being cleaned, prepped and painted. We are very literally making space for something new!

What will it be like to have Clemente in our building. Until now, Clemente has not had a "home" base so we are happy to be their official home which will enable them to expand their programming. I'm personally very excited to engage more with Clemente because they are the embodiment of community. They understand that each person comes to the table with their own unique needs and abilities and they strive to meet all of the individual needs of their students and families. Clemente has received much recognition for being a successful program. They are truly a gift to our community and we have so much to learn from them and there may be ways that we can partner with them to minister to those in need.

Change #2: Pastor Nathan is away for a three-month sabbatical. We knew for several months that Pastor Nathan would be gone July through September. Because of the advanced planning and well thought out work of the Sabbatical Planning Team, we are lucky to have everything laid out for us. The logistics are in place for us to be successful in Pastor Nathan's absence. Part of Pastor's sabbatical will be spent learning more about racism. The "I Have a Dream" grant from the Synod is funding some of the guest preachers at Trinity during Pastor's sabbatical and we were blessed by the residency of Elder Kalvin Cummings for some of the summer. We didn't expect to be challenged so **deeply.** So far this summer, we have been confronted with the idea that we aren't quite as welcoming as we thought we were and how our underlying biases may lead to micro aggressions. Elder Kalvin introduced the Adult Forum participants to black preaching and we wrestled with how different it "feels" for us Lutherans to hear/see/experience different styles of worship. What do we do with what we've learned? Our natural response to being challenged is to be defensive. But I am really grateful for the honest messages we've heard. We can't change unless we know what it is that we need to change.

It's natural for us to want quick answers and quick fixes to things. But we're learning that real change takes time and it takes "buy in" from the majority of people in order to change a church culture. In response to being challenged, on the Sundays *after* we have a guest preacher, we're gathering to listen, talk and process together. We don't know what else we'll be challenged with this summer but there will continue to be opportunities to learn and we look forward to processing it more with Pastor Nathan when he returns! Who knows what learnings or reflections Pastor Nathan will have to share with us?!

Change #3 The Playground structure has been removed. The Council approved the removal of the playground equipment at the August council meeting. Why? The playground was installed for use by the preschool students. It was designed only for children age 7 and under. The structure is more than 25 years old and there were some unsafe parts of the playground that were a liability for us. From my perspective, the playground has been an awkward thing to have because we haven't been able to allow all children to use it. Playgrounds are appealing to children (and their caregivers) but it doesn't feel very welcoming or loving when we allow some (but not all) children to use a playground that isn't safe. What next? Because we love and care about children, we want them to have a safe place to play. Estimates to replace the playground were in the \$100,000 range...yikes! Because it's cost prohibitive, we won't be able to have a large play structure similar to the one we had previously but there are plans to have things installed that children of all ages can safely use. That feels so much more welcoming and inclusive. Instead of saying "Sorry, no, you can't use the playground," we will eventually be able to say "Yes, you can use the playground!" Be on the lookout for more information about new playground plans soon!

Change #4 Death and Resurrection was the theme of the New England Synod Assembly in June. Many churches are having to make some really hard decisions about whether or not they can remain open or if they can proceed as they always have. Why? Generally speaking, the ways that people attend, participate and engage with churches have changed (and declined) globally. The workload of churches has increased but in many places, the resources have decreased.

The reality is that it costs a lot of money to keep church buildings open, to pay staff and do ministry. In some places, there isn't enough energy or money to keep things going the way they have been. In so many ways, that's beautiful stewardship to know when enough is enough. **The Good News!** God is not dead! God remains the same loving God who will always be, even if church buildings and institutions change or close. We encounter the living God every single day in every single place, not just in church buildings. **The ELCA knows what's going on.** Rev. Ruben Duran is the ELCA's Director of Congregational Vitality. At Synod Assembly, he shared some interesting points about all of the changes that are taking place.

The truth is that the ELCA will look and be very different in the coming years because churches will be different. He noted that:

- 1) communities are coming together differently
- 2) smaller, more intimate gatherings are desired
- 3) people aren't as interested in denominational affiliation as they used to be, rather "authenticity" is desirable
- 4) the birth rate is down, there are fewer families/young people in our neighborhoods
- 5) vital congregations do not focus on the pastor/staff or building but they focus on community and lay people

What about Trinity? We are VERY grateful and lucky to have such good stewards of our resources. Trinity is in a good position financially right now to continue in ministry. But we can't be complacent because the world is changing all around us and we are changing too. We need to always be asking questions about what's important and how God is leading us. How can we be a vital congregation that is: flexible...focused on the community rather than ourselves...realistic about the time, money and resources that it takes to do things...equipping one another to do ministry in the world...creative with our approach to challenges?

God is with us in this liminal season! None of us can know what the future holds. We don't know what Trinity will be like next year or in five years but we can do the important work during this time of change to reflect, be open to new ideas and different perspectives. We can step out of our comfort zones to foster resilience and deeper understandings of ourselves and our beliefs. Embracing change can lead to new insights, greater empathy and a stronger connection to our faith. As people of faith, we don't need to be afraid of the unknown because God is always with us!

COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S REPORT – KAREN COUTURIER

Sharing some brief highlights of August 14, 2023 Council meeting.

Council noted lots of ongoing work in various ministry teams and committees during the month of August. September is filled with events almost every Sunday including our Trinity Picnic on 9/10 and a Ministry Fair on 9/17. We continue to welcome guest preachers each Sunday as part of the 'I Have a Dream Grant "series.

Cantor Mark's report highlighted Elder Kalvin's role as an intern with us this summer. We are considering the possibility of having an intern next summer. Cantor Mark plans to add a new music component to the Sunday worship Time with Children this Fall.

Jena's monthly report highlighted activity in Ministry Teams;

- Faith in Action. Barbara Grusell has agreed to be in charge of the Little Free Pantry. There is no meal packing event scheduled this Fall. An alternative project related to Lutheran World Relief is planned for the winter months
- Hospitality, Fellowship and Welcoming are working on plans for the Pride Festival September 9 and The Trinity Church picnic September 10
- Ministry Cabinet is hosting a Ministry Fair September 17 following worship. This is a great opportunity to learn more about the different Ministry Teams available at Trinity.

Nancy's Treasurer's report notes that pledges continue to be ahead of budget. Our investment funds have done well in the past two months with gains in the MEF and Scholarship Fund. Our spending is approximately \$20,000 less year to date than at this time last year.

Finance committee requests that all committees and ministry teams that appear in the Budget prepare their budget requests for 2024 and submit them to Finance by October 15, 2023. Finance will submit a preliminary budget proposal to Council on November 6, 2023. A Budget information session will be presented to the congregation on Sunday November 12, 2023.

Council approved the appointment of Dick Liberty as Assistant Treasurer. Dick has been training with Nancy Fontneau and Scott Baeder and is a welcome addition to our Finance team.

Council approved the Property committee's recommendation to take down the playground structure. The current play gym is over 25 years old and deteriorating. The structure was designed for children ages preschool to grade 2. We currently have Trinity families and T.E.C. School students in grades 3 and older who would enjoy using the playground. With safety being our top priority, we are working with a Playground company to redesign the playground area to be safe, fun and usable by all children at Trinity. It is hoped the work on the new playground be completed by the fall months.

Stewardship chair Kevin Erkkila shared plans for the Fall stewardship campaign. Building Use

- Clemente's building use contract is in development for 2023 to 2024 year to begin September 1, 2023 to August 30, 2024.
- Building use contracts include input from our Building manager, Legal counsel and Congregation Council. It is our intention to have a standardized process and format for building use agreements to assure fair and equitable treatment of all parties.

Old Business

- Council voted to approve the SAFE Church policy for children and youth. The policy has been reviewed by the Personnel committee. The NE Synod strongly recommends congregations have a SAFE church policy in place.
- TLC Care Ministry Team proposed bylaws were reviewed pending one additional follow up item.

As we begin the last month of Pastor Nathan's sabbatical, we can reflect on what we have learned about the impact of racism from our guest clergy. Council has been hosting a Sunday morning forum at 11:30 a.m. to discuss the guest preacher's message from the previous Sunday. Roz and Dave Horn facilitated the sessions in July and August. All members of the congregation are invited to attend and share their observations and thoughts on the guest preachers we've heard through the "I Have a Dream Grant." All are welcome to attend.

Many thanks to all our Council members for their faith, dedication and perseverance in our work together. A reminder that Council meetings are open to all members of the congregation. TRINITY 75TH ANNIVERSARY

DID YOU KNOW?

- ➤ The Chancel looked somewhat different when Trinity Lutheran was new. Choir stalls ranged on both sides beneath the organ pipes, facing each other and seating up to 100 singers. The Moeller organ was relocated from First Lutheran Church; it's console was tucked into a front corner where the lectern stands today. By 1965, it was clear that the Moeller organ needed extensive repair, and its location and design hindered the sound and caused substantial lag time between playing notes and the sound reaching the congregation.
- ➤ On October 3, 1966, the congregation voted to purchase the present day 41-stop, 4 division Noack organ, along with a portable positive 3-stop organ for use in the chapel. The cost of the project, approximately \$125,000 also included altering the original gallery, which seated about 100 and was not large enough to accommodate the new instrument and the choir. Moving the organ and choir seating opened up the Chancel space for a free-standing altar and communion rails.
- ➤ The Noack was dedicated in March, 1969. The Noack is a tracker organ, which is a design that dates back more than 500 years and allows direct mechanical action between the three (3) manuals, the pedals and the 3,000 pipes, allowing for more sensitive touch and interpretation. The pipes range from the size of a pencil to the 8-foot tall pipes on either side of the organ case.
