I Thank God for You Cantor Mark Mummert

In October during our Sunday worship, we are reading from Paul's letter to the Philippians. Paul established the first Christian church in Europe in the city of Philippi in Macedonia, which is modern day Greece. Paul penned the letter to the church in Philippi while he was in jail for preaching the gospel. He wrote:

I thank God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. [Philippians 1:3]

This letter from Paul is his most joyful, even though it was sent while he was in prison. In the letter, he thanks the congregation for financial support for his ministry. Moreover, he encourages the church to be of one mind in Christ. I've been reflecting on this letter from Paul in the context of Pastor Nathan's sabbatical leave, a time during which he has been apart from us. I do not wish to suggest a sabbatical leave is like prison, but nonetheless, our pastoral leader has been apart from us for three months and we now are glad to welcome him home. I wonder what Pastor Nathan might have written to us while he was away. What may have changed in our congregation mirroring the changes that happened at Philippi in Paul's absence? In what ways has our congregation been of one mind in Christ? How have we failed to recognize Christ as our savior, or as Paul notes while quoting an early Christian hymn, a servant Savior who "humbled himself on a cross"? [Philippians 2:8]

If one pays attention to the news about Christianity in the United States today, one cannot help but see that churches are changing dramatically. We might even say our congregation has changed in these last three months, given the diverse preachers we have invited to bring us good news, or observing the worship attendance records, or the lack of available volunteer help for projects or ministries.

How congregations navigate these changes leads to many outcomes – some congregations cannot sustain the changes and die, while others face the changes honestly and reshape or reform such that a revitalization can happen.

Plus, can we agree that we hope pastor's sabbatical has changed Pastor Nathan? I hope so! What has he learned during his time away, or how might he see things differently, given a change of scenery? Will he bring fresh ideas or perspectives to us as he resumes his ministry among us. What are the ways we can listen carefully to him as he proclaims the gospel and administers the sacraments at Trinity Church? For some, the prospect of more change is daunting. For others, change is exciting! How can each of us be a bit like Paul, and reflect joyfully about our common ministry, even while being held in the many different chains that enslave us, particularly the chains of being stuck in a bygone past.

Come to church this October and hear the writings of Paul with new ears. Come to worship again to be renewed in the Spirit blowing newness in our congregation, in the church, and in the world. Come to Trinity this fall and commit yourself again to our mutual task of welcoming, proclaiming, and serving in Christ's name. Come and help us welcome back Pastor Nathan!

COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S REPORT – KAREN COUTURIER

Sharing some brief highlights of September 11, 2023 Council meeting:

Council noted lots of ongoing work in various ministry teams and committees during the month of September. The Annual Church Picnic was filled with great food and fellowship. The Ministry Fair on 9/17 featured the many areas of ministry and service teams we have at Trinity. There are so many ways to be involved sharing your time, talents, and gifts.

As we begin October, we welcome back Pastor Nathan from his sabbatical and are eager to share our mutual learning experiences. While it's tempting to hope "things will get back to normal" it's exciting to anticipate how our ministry together may be renewed, refreshed and refocused.

Cantor Mark's report highlighted a very busy summer with five funerals, worship preparation, restarting choir season and preparing a Music at Trinity event, Three Choir Hymn Festival on October 22 Cantor Mark has added a new music component to the Sunday Worship Time with Children.

Jena's report highlighted lots of activity in Ministry Teams;

- Faith in Action. School supplies were delivered to Elm Park Community school. Team will collect financial contributions to purchase bulk Christmas gifts for Lutheran home residents.
- Hospitality, Fellowship and Welcoming participated in Worcester Pride Festival September 9 and Trinity Church picnic September 10
- Questions from community members on how are we serving our community? What are we doing to help Haitian refugees?
- Reflections and questions on who we are as a church community in an urban setting. How/where are we focusing our attention and energy?

Nancy's Treasurer's report notes that pledges continue to be ahead of budget. Our investment funds showed a loss in August but our spending of the MEF is less than projected for this time of year. At the end of August, our operating expenses exceeded our income by \$5677, but total expenses were still within budget.

Finance committee requests that all committees and ministry teams prepare their budget requests for 2024 and submit them to Finance by October 15, 2023. Finance will submit a preliminary budget proposal to Council on November 6, 2023. A Budget information session will be presented to the congregation on Sunday, November 19, 2023

Council focused a significant amount of time on Building Use issues. We are learning more about our building use agreements and what elements of a contract help to establish healthy boundaries and clearly defined responsibilities. It is our intention to have a standardized process and format to assure fair and equitable treatment of all parties.

Clemente moved in to the second floor of the education wing in mid-September. We welcome them as they begin their first year in developing their new Micro College program.

The playground area has been cleared of the play gym structure and support pad. Council formed a task force to consider plans for the playground going forward. Questions to consider: Who is it for? Who will use it? What sort of play structure? How does this address the church's mission?

Council voted to give \$1,000. from the Altar and Organ Fund toward the preservation of the King Gustav Altar Antependium. The 75th Anniversary restoration team has a quote of \$5,300 from Ed Turner of Art and Frame Emporium to preserve the historic fabric in a museum ultraviolet plexiglass frame to prevent fading and discoloration. The 75th Anniversary Team continues to welcome donations to support this project and 75th Anniversary activities.

Many thanks to all our Council members for their faith, dedication and perseverance in our work together. A reminder that Council meetings are open to all members of the congregation. School Days: All of the Shams children are back in school, and Noor Jamal, the mother, will be taking English classes through the Worcester Public Schools beginning in late September. She understands a lot of English in conversation, but since she was not literate in her own language, learning to read and write English is a challenge. We thank Bev Hobbs and Susan Brown for continuing to help the family with English.

You can help!!! With Noor Jamal going back to school at the Fanning Building on Chatham Street, we will definitely need drivers who can take her there on Monday, Wednesday or Thursday at 9:00 and home at 12:00. It is not very far, but Noor Jamal's arthritis in her knees makes it impossible for her to walk that far. If you can help even once a month, please be in touch with Barb Grusell rgrusell@charter.net. She has been a great help in arranging transportation for education and shopping.

Good news! Although they are more independent than when they first arrived, they still need help, especially in deciphering official mail. Recently Nader Shah texted me a picture of an envelope from the Department of Homeland Security, and said, "I think we need your help."

When I got to the house, there were eight of those envelopes, one for each family member, each containing a letter saying that their permission to stay in the US had been extended for another year, until October 2024. We celebrated! I told them I had worried, because their original ID cards were set to expire in November. I wish the letters had said their status was secure indefinitely, but at least they are secure for now. Lawyers at Ascentria continue to work for them, and hopefully Nader Shah and his father will be able to get Green Cards. Please let us know if you would like to be involved in this ministry to the Afghan family. You will truly be blessed by your interaction with them. Thank you, as always, for your help and prayers!

DID YOU KNOW?

Besides the four cornerstones, there are several memorial plaques and objects in the nave of the church. Over the steps to the chancel, the stained glass rood cross is given in memory of George A. and Mabel A. Peterson.

Beginning at the door to the chapel, moving clockwise around the nave:

- A plaque in memory of Arthur Sinclair Covey, who painted the ceiling murals
- A plaque in memory of Captain George Fried, USN
- A niche with a bridal crown that is available to any couple who wed in Trinity Lutheran Church, with a poem inscribed above and a book of inscribed names below
- A plaque dedicating the nave ceiling to the memory of Aldous Chapin Higgins

Moving around to the opposite wall:

- A plaque in tribute to George Nathaniel Jeppson, chairman of the Building Committee and lifelong member and supporter of the church
- The Book of Remembrance with a plaque above inscribed with "A prayer for the Evening"
- A plaque in honor of the Armed Forces who fought in World Wars I & II & Korea

More memorials and documents are found in the hallway by Jeppson Hall:

- A plaque to the memory of friends of the church
- A wooden plaque said to be carved from an elm tree under which Martin Luther rested en route to the Diet of Worms in 1521
- The covenant between Trinity Lutheran and Blessed Sacrament Churches
- Trinity's welcoming statement and certification as a member of Reconciling in Christ

On October 22, Trinity members will be called upon once again to make their annual financial commitment to our congregation's ministry. In recognition of Trinity's 75th anniversary, temple talkers on October 1, 8, and 15 will share their reflections on this year's stewardship theme, "With Thanks for the Past, Faithfulness in the Present, and Hope for the Future."
