A Carol for Our Time

Each year during Advent and Christmas I am eager to find a new carol to celebrate the season. I love the traditional carols, but a new carol helps me to sing the truth about our longing for God to come to us today.

This year a friend pointed me to this Christmas carol, with words fashioned by Herman G. Stuempfle, Jr. in 1995. Dr. Stuempfle was for many years the president of the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg. In his retirement he composed some 600 hymns, some of which are in our latest hymnals.

This carol, *Where Nights Are Torn by Siren's Wail*, seems to me to be full of the reality of our present time. The carol can be sung to the tune of *It Came Upon a Midnight Clear*. I hope this carol can be for you a downpayment on the promise of God, that, even when it appears the darkest and most dire, Christ comes bringing peace, love, and light.

Where nights are torn by siren's wail and din of blaring horn,
on streets where threats of violence lurk, the Child again is born.
No cattle bend before his crib; no shepherds crowd his stall;
yet here, where life is harsh and hard, he comes with love for all.

In homes unlit by laughter bright, where hearts are sad, forlorn, where want and worry darken hope the Child of Light is born. No kings bow down to worship him; no star with splendor shine; yet still, where deepest darkness lies, he makes a holy shrine. Where bombs of death are raining down on homes by terror torn,
where sounds of battle never cease, the holy Child is born.
No angel choirs wing the sky to fill the night with song;
yet still appears the Prince of Peace to whom all worlds belong.

Where streams of people flee in fear, of home and kindred shorn,
where hungry children waste and die, the homeless Child is born.
The Christ whose parents sped him far from threat of Herod's hand,
comes near and with compassion shares the pain of every land.

Sing praise that God, for love of us, descended in the night and, in the shadowed stable stall, touched earth with heaven's light. Sing praise to God who came in flesh to bear all sin and scorn. Sing praise that still, where all is dark, a Child for us is born.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S REPORT – KAREN COUTURIER

Sharing some brief highlights of the November 6, 2023 Council meeting. Council focused our attention on three major areas.

Staffing Plan Discernment

Council discussed staffing needs in light of the vacant Youth, Family and Outreach Minister position. Pastor Nathan met with Sunday School families and reported parents expressed strong appreciation and support for continuing current Sunday programming. Families and children are excited and engaged in the weekly Sunday morning Children's Message, followed by Chapel time and music with Cantor Mark. Parents are willing to help with Sunday morning time as long as support is provided for activities or curriculum. Families want to continue monthly Family Sunday school. Beth Getman will facilitate the December 3rd session. With regard to staffing decisions, we will include parents in decision making, planning and implementation. Addressing faith formation education needs and keeping our young families engaged in the life of the church is a top priority.

We are taking time to discern staffing needs, trying to fully evaluate what we need to carry out Trinity's mission. Council discussed the option of multiple part time positions to cover needed roles. Staff shared ideas based on areas of greatest need including communication and use of social media, a building attendant for Saturday events and a volunteer coordinator as examples. We will consider use of part time positions, volunteers and student interns to help fill needed roles. We discussed ways to identify skills, gifts and talents of our people and matching them to areas reflecting their strengths. We affirmed the value of personally inviting others to share in ministry service.

Preliminary Budget 2024

Nancy Fontneau reviewed the Preliminary 2024 budget prepared by the Finance Committee for presentation to the congregation for discussion November 19, 2023. Council recommended the preliminary budget be presented to the congregation for review and discussion. Some highlights new for 2024 include:

- Total projected income \$ 724,500.
- Total projected expenses \$750,350.

- Budget projections for the Mission Endowment Fund are based on the for 20quarter lookback average.
- 3.5% raises for professional staff, 10% raises for hourly staff.
- Addition of a line item for a part time staff position for \$25,000.00
- The Final 2024 budget will be voted on during the January 28 annual meeting.

Nancy noted pledge income has been above budget consistently in 2023. We are grateful for the generosity of the people of Trinity!

Other updates

T.E.C. school building use update – The negotiating team met November 8, 2023 to discuss plan for 2024-2025. We are preparing the transition to a standardized lease. We hope to have decision for 2024 -2025 school year by the Annual meeting January 28,2024.

Nominating committee is looking for Council candidates for the 2024 council year. Eligible for another term are Jim Drackley, Rick Lagueux, Dale Mattice, Suzanne Whitmarsh and Matthew Whitmarsh. Mary Tarquinio will finish her term in January 2024. Many thanks to all council members who have served in 2023. When someone from the Nominating committee reaches out to you, please consider sharing your gifts and talents in serving on council.

Many thanks to all our Council members for their faith, dedication and perseverance in our work together. A reminder that Council meetings are open to all members of the congregation. The humanitarian crisis continues to worsen – almost 70% of Gazan residents are displaced, and resources such as food, water and medical supplies are in short supply.

- The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land. The church provides emergency education support for families who have lost income due to the war and are unable to pay school fees.
- ACT Alliance. Through implementing partners Lutheran World Federation and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land, ACT Alliance responds to immediate needs for psychosocial support, shelter, household items, public health centers and direct cash assistance, focusing on the Palestinian communities in Gaza, East Jerusalem and the West Bank.

Dear friends in Christ,

What a joy it is to see the many ways that God's love has moved through your community of faith over the last seventy-five years; and even more, to see the ways you continue your faithful ministry today and into the future! While I am unable to join you in person for your 75th anniversary celebration, I am with you in spirit.

As dean of the Central Massachusetts conference, I am grateful for Trinity's consistent leadership and partnership within the conference and the wider New England Synod. Many of our Central Massachusetts congregations have worked together with you over the years to provide a vibrant witness to the power of God at work in Jesus Christ. That work continues today through ministry amongst our youth, ministry to refugee and migrant families, ministry at the Lutheran Rehabilitation and Skilled Care Center, and many more.

In particular, I give thanks for your leadership in strengthening the worship life of our conference and of our Synod.
