Beset By Change, But Spirit-Led Cantor Mark Mummert

On Sunday, June 2, we will sing this now well-known stanza of a hymn by Fred Pratt Green (ELW Hymn 729):

Change. We are always changing. For some, change is a welcome activity. For others, change is a difficult burden. But it seems that life is constantly full of change for all of us. How we adapt to change, whether we grow or resist, shows our personality and emotional intelligence.

June is a month of change for us at Trinity Church. The Montessori T. E. C. School will be moving out of our building and a new school will be moving in. President Guy Erwin from United Lutheran Seminary will present a forum on June 9 concerning the changes in the ELCA and in our seminaries. Our synod will elect a new bishop in June. New hymns will be added to our repertoire in worship. God only knows what other changes are in our future.

For some, church should be a place without much change. Our belief in a steadfast and faithful God leads us to expect that churches should also be sturdy places of little change. Others thrive on the ongoing movement of the Holy Spirit to provoke and move us to new places of faith and life. Which are you? Are you ready for change? Are you longing for things to stay the same?

The bible says we will all be changed. In Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, when speaking about the resurrection, says this:

Look, I will tell you a mystery! We will not all die, but we will all be changed, in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. [1 Corinthians 15:51-52, NRSVue]

The promise of this change in Christ is one to which we can look forward. And, if we can stand it, all the little changes that come along the pathway of life. With all of the changes, according to the hymn, we are invited to *claim and test the heritage*, and thus be resurrected to new life, with each rising of the sun.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S REPORT – ROZ HORN

There was a <u>Special Congregational Council Meeting held on April 29, 2024</u> to hear a presentation by representatives of Summit Academy. Summit Academy desires to lease space in Trinity's Education Wing for the coming school year. Summit Academy is a non-profit private special needs school that accepts students in grades K-12 from school districts throughout central Massachusetts. More information may be found on their website, *summitacademyma.com*.

Following the school's presentation, Frank Ricardo, Building Manager, described the proposed lease financial income, which would more than compensate for the loss of income from the T.E.C. Schools (whose lease is ending and who are moving out in early July). The Council decided to hold an e-vote on this proposal following the open discussion session regarding future building use which was planned for the congregation on Sunday, May 5. This was done, and the motion to enter into a one-year lease with Summit Academy was approved unanimously.

Here are some highlights from the regular monthly <u>Congregational Council Meeting of</u> <u>May 13, 2024.</u>

REPORTS:

Pastor Nathan reported on his activities during April, and announced that there will be an official farewell to Rupali Sharma, Director of the T.E.C. Schools, after the 10 a.m. Service on Sunday, June 2, 2024. The guest preacher on June 9th will be The Rev. Dr. Guy Erwin, President of United Lutheran Seminary. Pastor Nelson Rabell-Gonzalez has been tentatively rescheduled to preach on August 11.

Cantor Mark reported on his activities during April, and announced that Trinity will be involved with the Complete Bach project of Music Worcester, and has already hosted the video launch of the project. Also, the Master Singers of Worcester will begin holding their regular weekly rehearsals at Trinity on Wednesdays, beginning in August. The Trinity Choir has 4 new members! Treasurer Nancy Fontneau reported on Finances for April. The Finance team is managing the new Quickbooks software more successfully. Church expenses are higher, especially for insurance, although pledge income remains ahead by 15%. Withdrawals of \$6,000/month from the MEF (Mission Endowment Fund) have begun. The Finance Committee recommended one additional money counter to be approved by Council, but more money counters are still needed. The Committee is very pleased with the response by Trinity members who volunteered to serve in many ways through the Time & Talent Forms, and suggests that the information gathered from those forms be captured in a database.

The Faith Formation Ministry Team reported on the current Faith Formation activities for youth and adults, and presented plans for several discussion series to be held throughout the next year.

The Hospitality, Fellowship and Welcoming Team reported that they will launch the "Coffee Hour Green Initiative" in June, which includes plans for members to bring their own coffee mugs. PRIDE shirts are available. The Worcester PRIDE Festival will be held on September 7 and Trinity's Annual Picnic will be held on September 8.

There was a report on the Building Use Conversation held on May 5, led by Karen Couturier and Roz Horn. The report included some of the ideas generated by members attending that meeting. The Council members were then invited to offer their own ideas and dreams for future activities and ministries, especially regarding the extra classroom space available after June.

OLD BUSINESS:

<u>Coffee Hour</u>: the Council will host the Coffee Hour on May 19. <u>Audit Committee</u>: Ed Sproul, Pam Mahoney and Loie Angelsten have begun a review of the 2023 Financials and Council Minutes.

NEW BUSINESS:

Barbara Grusell was appointed as the Chair of the Faith in Action team. The committee overseeing lease agreements, in consultation with the Building Manager, will provide plans for addressing the move-in needs of Summit Academy. This report by the President of the Church Council is an informal summary of the business conducted by the Council each month. It is offered in order to facilitate open communication between Trinity's church leadership and the general membership. A detailed report of each Council meeting is recorded by the Council Secretary and reported to the Council at the next monthly meeting. Once those Minutes have been approved by the Council, they are available to anyone who requests a copy.

NEW ENGLAND SYNOD ASSEMBLY AND BISHOP ELECTION JUNE 6-8 / The Annual New England Synod Assembly will be held June 6-8, 2024 at the DCU Center in Worcester. With the theme "Journey Forward," the Assembly will elect a new bishop for the New England Synod, fill open positions on the Synod Council and Synod Discipline Committee, and elect rostered ministers and lay members as voting members to the ELCA Churchwide Assembly. Special Assembly guests will include the Rev. Dr. Guy Erwin, President of United Lutheran Seminary; the Rev. Dr. Mark Alan Powell who will be giving the keynote address; Mr. Imran Didiqui, ELCA Vice-President; and Ms. Lori Fedyk, ELCA Treasurer.

Pastor Nathan is among 10 Pre-Identified Persons (PIP's) participating in the Bishop's election. Other PIP's include: Pastors Marjo Anderson, Sara Anderson, Susan Gaeta, Scott Howard, Erica Kennedy, Jeanette Leisk, William Peterson, Kyle Seibert, and Kari Jo Verhulst. Additional candidates may be identified on the first ballot. Balloting will occur June 6-7 with the Bishop-elect identified by the end of business on Friday, June 7. UNITED LUTHERAN SEMINARY PRESIDENT GUEST PREACHER SUNDAY,

JUNE 9 / The Rev. Dr. R. Guy Erwin, president of United Lutheran Seminary (Philadelphia & Gettysburg) and Ministerium of Pennsylvania Chair and Professor of Reformation Studies, will be the guest preacher at Trinity's 10:00 a.m. Holy Eucharist on Sunday, June 9. He will also lead the 9:00 a.m. Adult Forum entitled "The seminary's role in the future of the ELCA."

Prior to his call as President of United Lutheran Seminary, President Erwin served as the bishop of the Southwest California Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.



President Erwin is the ELCA's first gay, partnered bishop and the first openly gay male to serve in that office in the churches of the Lutheran World Federation. As an enrolled member of the Osage Nation, on whose reservation he was born in Oklahoma, he is also the first Native bishop in the ELCA. He holds a bachelor's degree and two master's degrees from Harvard University and a doctorate from Yale University.

SUMMIT ACADEMY TO BEGIN TENURE AT TRINITY – JULY 1 / The

Congregational Council, in a unanimous vote and after hearing only positive affirmation at the May 5 Building Use Forum, has voted to enter into a relationship with Summit Academy, Worcester for use of the ground and first floor of the Education Wing. The agreement begins July 1, 2024 and involves some of the spaces being vacated by The T.E.C. Schools when their lease expires June 30, 2024.

Summit Academy (www.summitacademyma.com) is a 501(c) (3) non-profit licensed therapeutic school alternative for students with autism and related diagnoses in Kindergarten through 12th grades. Total annual enrollment ranges between 20 to 35 students who have been referred to Summit from local school districts in Central Massachusetts. Many of these students have experienced bullying. Summit provides a 4:1 student to staff ratio in striving to provide a safe, compassionate, and loving school experience to help these students prepare for healthy adult lives. Summit staff shared with the Council their excitement in exploring collaborations with the people of Trinity, specifically around social service and community projects. Of course, any time is a good time to participate in God's work, including now. The summer presents its own set of challenges, particularly for the unhoused and others lacking in resources. Food banks, such as the Carty Cupboard, often struggle to meet the needs of their clients in summer, mainly because the summer is not perceived to be a time of privation. Those summer needs will also include essential personal care items such as soap, shampoo, sunscreen, and mosquito repellant. One way we can help address those needs locally is through donations to our Little Free Pantry of personalsize bottles of shampoo, sunscreen and the like, as well as those little hotel soaps brought home from vacation. Thanks also to all those who have responded to the Stewardship of the Earth piece in last month's *Trinity News* on alternatives to recycling. This month, the Hospitality, Fellowship and Welcoming team will kick off the Coffee Hour Green Initiative, inviting and encouraging members to bring their own mugs to church for coffee hour, as a more eco-friendly option than paper cups (which will still be there for those who forget).
