COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S REPORT – ROZ HORN

Here are some highlights from the regular monthly <u>Congregational Council Meeting of Dec. 9, 2024.</u> If you wish to read the complete, detailed reports, they are available in the church office.

REPORTS:

<u>Pastor Mark Perry</u> submitted a report on his activities, including an update on the Transition Team, who are preparing a "History Sharing Event" for the congregation on Jan.11, 2025. See more information on that event in the December Trinity News. The Team is also gathering information to share about the various groups that use the spaces in our building.

<u>Cantor Mark</u> reported on his activities in the past month, and reminded us of the Advent Vespers Service on Sunday, Dec. 15th at 4 p.m. Other musical events include the Women's Ensemble of the Worcester Chorus at 4 p.m. on Dec. 22nd.

<u>Treasurer Nancy Fontneau</u> reported on Finances for November. Income and expenses are on target. Building Maintenance is above budget but this will be reconciled when we are reimbursed by Summit Academy for the renovations completed in their classroom and office spaces. The estimated budget for 2025 was discussed under New Business.

<u>The Building Manager</u>'s report noted that the Property Committee, augmented by a few extra volunteers, has begun a review of the three bids for the roofing project to repair 2 leaks. Volunteers for the "Roofing Task Force" are meeting with the Property Committee, so there is no longer any need to consider a separate group for that task.

<u>The Finance Committee</u> reported that our accountant, Karen Spinelli, has reviewed our financial statements for 2021 and 2022, and found them to be in order. The report for 2023 is forthcoming. The Finance Committee recommends that the proposed 2024 budget be approved; to appear under New Business.

<u>The Property Committee</u> reported that plans are underway to prepare extra classroom space for Summit Academy as earlier approved by Council. A new Chair for Property Committee is being sought as Judy Willoughby is stepping down as Chair at the end of December.

Ministry Teams:

The Faith Formation Ministry Team submitted a report outlining upcoming events. Hospitality, Fellowship and Welcoming reported that church members have requested that Jeppson Hall be open on Sundays when there is no coffee hour so that members can "gather and gab." This will be done, but there will be no coffee or snacks provided. This group welcomes Judy Willoughby as the new Chair in January.

The Artwork Committee, having been asked by Council to arrange for some feedback from the congregation regarding the new Lattimore Icon, presented a plan for feedback via a written survey, because there appeared to be no time slots possible for a discussion on most Sundays, given the Faith Formation and Coffee Hour schedules. Citing the importance of personal interaction during "feedback." Council members rearranged the Faith Formation schedule to allow for Sunday, January 12 to be available for discussions at both 9 a.m. and 11:30 a.m.

Cantor Mark will convey this information to the Artwork Committee. It was also suggested that Committee volunteers stand near the Icon on Sunday mornings and engage members in conversation while they wait in line to greet the pastor. The Artwork Committee also submitted some drafts of procedural guidelines for decision-making regarding actions concerning artwork in the church.

OLD BUSINESS:

Recommendation by the Finance Committee to approve the proposed budget for 2025. Additional information regarding the proposed budget: Includes estimates for expenses for the Transition Team and Call Committee; difficult to estimate future Wages and Salaries because of calling a new pastor; for these reasons it is a deficit budget. Following discussion, the proposed budget was unanimously approved.

NEW BUSINESS:

A well-written and detailed proposal by the Artwork Team to have a Black History Month Art Exhibit in Trinity's hallway met with unanimous approval. Over the next several months, the Council will be examining the process of decision-making at Trinity in order to see how it happens and to improve the process if needed. To begin, Council members gave examples of decisions made in the past by Council or persons in authority at Trinity and discussed the outcomes.

Following a reminder that Annual Reports are due in January, the meeting was adjourned with prayer.

This report by the President of the Church Council is an informal summary of the business conducted by the Council each month. It is offered in order to facilitate open communication between Trinity's church leadership and the general membership. A detailed report of each Council meeting is recorded by the Council Secretary and reported to the Council at the next monthly meeting. Once those Minutes have been approved by the Council, they are available to anyone who requests a copy.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

BLACK HISTORY MONTH ART EXHIBIT AT TRINITY/ In February 2024, the Worcester Black History Project displayed artwork by people of color at the Worcester Center for Crafts. Thanks to the efforts of Mary Fletcher and the Art Committee, this project is expanding in 2025 to include Trinity Lutheran Church.

During the month of February 2025, artwork will be displayed in the hallway between the Office and the Nave. Artwork prints will be suspended from wires hung with hooks from the ceiling rails or on fabric suspended from the rails with prints affixed to it. These will be installed by a professional under the direction of our Building Manager.

The theme of Black History Month this year is, "I've Known Rivers, African Americans and Labor." Pieces of art will be chosen that are appropriate for families and children, and mindful that the venue is a church. Artists from all over New England will be considered.

This exhibit will be primarily for the people who use the church for rehearsals and meetings who will see the artwork when they are in the hallway, or heading to the Nave for services. Trinity will not be open other than for our usual business. There will be no cost to Trinity for this exhibit.

The purpose of this effort by the Art Committee is to do our part in making TLC a more open church, welcoming to all and respecting of every persuasion and ethnicity. We think Trinity will benefit from this project as it will give us an exposure and standing in the community. It is a 'public' effort to declare that we are truly a church open to all in keeping with our mission, and is soundly endorsed by the Church Council. Being a participant in the Black History Art Project will help 'put us on the map' so to speak as being the welcoming place we are trying to be. It is an attempt to widen our circle. Be sure to mention to your friends that Trinity is part of the Black History Month project!

ARTWORK COMMITTEE UPDATE/ In November, the Trinity Council approved the relocation of the artwork featuring black children from its current location in the Library, to the downstairs education room CE LL 10 & 11. The Artwork team was encouraged by Trinity's welcome statement that says "we are a community of faith that believes each person is a beloved child of God" and we are committed to work for racial equity and justice. By hanging this artwork of black persons, including, but not limited to children, we are providing a tangible representation of our work to be an inclusive body of Christ.



According to an article on Sesame Street Workshop, preschool children are already noticing physical differences between people such as skin tone and hair texture. The conscious choice to have this image hung in the downstairs education room CE LL 10 & 11 used for Family Sunday School provides an opportunity to showcase inclusion, encourage conversation among children and families and provide necessary representation of people of color.

SOME RESOLUTIONS YOU MIGHT KEEP

Change is hard, but that's what we aspire to when making New Year's resolutions. Yet, despite good intentions, our resolve often melts away before February. We set ourselves up for failure when we (1) overcommit ourselves to a radical change in our behavior and (2) don't share our intentions with anyone in advance—after all, who wants to have to answer questions about their abandoned diet or exercise program? For 2025, the Stewardship Team is pleased to offer some suggestions for modest commitments to action that will benefit both you and others. They are painless (mostly), most involve interaction with others, and all incorporate a degree of generosity, kindness, respect and care.

- 1. Drive less, walk more. You'll get exercise at your own pace, and a chance to see things you may have missed.
- **2. Talk less, listen more.** You don't have to agree with everything you hear, but you never know what you'll learn.

- **3. Volunteer for a <u>new</u> cause.** Join a new group, committee, or team. It could be a Trinity ministry, but other opportunities include government, education, sports, or public charities.
- **4. Make time for friends.** Stay in touch, whether by phone, social media or in person. Do something together: organize a shopping trip, meet for breakfast, lunch, or coffee.
- **5. Treat someone you don't know.** Donate to a food pantry, homeless shelter, or maybe pay the tab for the party in line behind you at the drive-up window.
- **6. Smile when you don't feel like it.** Smiling when you're down lightens your mood and can actually make you feel good. Cats know this—it's why they purr when they're annoyed or in pain.
- 7. Ask for help. Share your load and give someone else a chance to do a good deed!

UPDATE ON THE SHAM FAMILY - BESS & ED SPROUL

On January 12, 2022, a group of excited Trinity Neighborhood Support Team members waited at the Worcester Airport for the arrival of our Afghan family of 8. They had flown that day from New Mexico to LaGuardia airport in New York, and were driven by van to meet us.

We gave them winter coats, and welcomed them to their new, cold home.

For the first week, they stayed at a hotel while our volunteers worked tirelessly to finish preparing an apartment for them. Ken Johnson helped with a Pashto translation app, and we were able to begin to communicate.

Three years have passed. Shah Mohammed, the father, is working at Chick Fil A in Marlborough. Noor Jamal, the mother, has received good care, thanks to Mass Health, for multiple medical issues. She supervises the immaculate home and cares for her family. Nader Shah, the eldest son, has recently begun work at Berry Global Corp. in Sterling. He has a car and his license, and is beginning to take some responsibility for driving his mother to the India market in Shrewsbury, where they find the kind of produce and Halal meats that they need. Shabana, 20, and Asmatullah, 19, will graduate in June from Gerald Creamer Center, a program of the Worcester Public Schools for students who are English language learners. They are looking at options for job training and continuing education. Shukria, 18, and Hedayatullah, 16, are students at Doherty High School. Asma, 10, is in 4th grade at Chandler School, and speaks English very well. To complete the family, a nephew and his wife came to Worcester in the fall of 2022, and welcomed a baby girl, who just turned 2.

All of the Shams are adjusting to life here, but they will always miss Afghanistan. They had a beautiful home with a lot of land, and Nader Shah recently told me that they had 500 apple trees. When Shah Mohammed came home from his job as security guard with the American forces, he would spend hours pruning and tending the trees. In season, the boys used to take the apples to the market to sell. They do appreciate their apartment, but obviously it's not the same.

Exciting news! In December, the family had an appointment with the legal department at Ascentria. They have submitted all the necessary documents to apply for their Green Cards. Hopefully they will have their interviews very soon. This will give them Permanent Resident Status, which will be a much more secure status than the Authorization to Work Cards that they currently have.

On behalf of the Shams family, thank you to all who have prayed, contributed and volunteered in any way. We have recently used the NST fund to pay for the medical exams for the Green Card applications, an expense that they would have had trouble paying. Shah Mohammed has not learned a lot of English, but he does know, and says often, "Thank you so much!"
