We enjoyed delicious breakfast food (thank you to all who contributed to an abundant feast!), warm fellowship, and being reminded of where we come from, where we are now, and where we believe God is leading us. Our next project for the transition will be to gather Trinity members and friends in "Congregational Focus Group Conversations." We are scheduling these initial times and places for the Conversations: Sunday, February 9 at 9:00 a.m. and 11:15 a.m. in Jeppson Hall; Sunday, February 16 at 11:30 a.m. in the Fellowship Hall and Sunday, February 23 at 9:00 a.m. and 11:15 a.m. in Jeppson Hall. These will be facilitated by our Transition Team members. Watch for that information soon and be sure to sign up for one of the groups or you can just "show up." Other Focus Group Conversations are happening at "Dine with Nine" events, Trinity Book Club, Family Sunday School and Senior Luncheon. The questions that will be asked will be made available soon if you're interested in seeing them in advance.

All the input derived from these events will be summarized, analyzed and used to help fill out the ELCA "Ministry Site Profile" (MSP), which will be used by the New England Synod to help match us with a good pastoral candidate during the Call Process. Thank you, also, to those who have already offered to serve on the Call Committee. Your Congregational Council will consider these and other nominees and appoint that important committee in the near future. Let us, Pastor Perry or the Council President know if you are also interested in serving.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

BLACK HISTORY MONTH ART EXHIBIT AT TRINITY/ In February 2024, the Worcester Black History Project displayed artwork by people of color at the Worcester Center for Crafts. Thanks to the efforts of Mary Fletcher and the Art Committee, this project is expanding in 2025 to include Trinity Lutheran Church.

During the month of February 2025, artwork will displayed in the hallway between the Office and the Nave. Artwork prints will be suspended from wires hung with hooks from the ceiling rails or on fabric suspended from the rails with prints affixed to it. These will be installed by a professional under the direction of our Building Manager.

The theme of Black History Month this year is, "I've Known Rivers. African Americans and Labor". Pieces of art will be chosen that are appropriate for families and children, and mindful that the venue is a church. Artists from all over New England will be considered.

This exhibit will be primarily for the people who use the church for rehearsals and meetings who will see the artwork when they are in the hallway, or heading to the Nave for services. Trinity will not be open other than for our usual business. There will be no cost to Trinity for this exhibit.

The purpose of this effort by the Art Committee is to do our part in making TLC a more open church, welcoming to all and respecting of every persuasion and ethnicity. We think Trinity will benefit from this project as it will give us an exposure and standing in the community.

It is a 'public' effort to declare that we are truly a church open to all in keeping with our mission, and is soundly endorsed by the Church Council. Being a participant in the Black History Art Project will help 'put us on the map' so to speak as being the welcoming place we are trying to be. It is an attempt to widen our circle. VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!! Trinity's ministry programs, while supported financially by the congregation and led by staff, often rely on volunteers to fulfill their goals. This year during Lent we will be encouraging members to commit to volunteering for a program, either at Trinity or elsewhere, in which they have not previously participated. Volunteer opportunities at Trinity are always open to members and friends, and examples of their work appear in each committee or ministry team report in the congregation's Annual Report. However, we acknowledge that these ministries do not include all the needs that could be served and may not always align with what motivates someone to volunteer.

There are many organizations in our communities, state and country supporting causes and values consistent with ours that offer individuals with specific interests or skills additional opportunities to do God's work through service to others. Some examples of these are food banks, organizations that build or repair housing for the needy, disaster relief efforts, and animal rescue services.

Serving others through local charitable organizations builds awareness of our congregation's presence in the community and, in turn, generates interest in the ministries that Trinity sponsors directly. More information will be forthcoming on the formal commitment process we will be using. Meanwhile, let's think about and discuss new ways in which our hands can do God's work.

UPCOMING EVENTS

THE COMPLETE BACH PROJECT AND TRINITY CHURCH / In 11 years, during 12 concerts each year, ALL of the works of J. S. MEAL PACKING EVENT / Trinity is planning a meal-packing event on April 5, 2025. We plan to put together 20,000 meals for the local food pantries. The meals we will pack are either rice, pasta or oatmeal with a protein supplement and flavor packet. They taste good and provide 6-12 grams of protein, include real fruits and vegetables and are vitamin fortified. This is truly a community! We need your financial help and your physical help on April 5th. A sign-up sheet will be coming in March. Right now, we need you to think about how much this is helping God's children, our neighbors, and how much you can help. The cost for the products is \$7,400. We have solicited financial institutions, but we need your financial help. Please consider a monthly donation to this worthy project.
